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"Now I Have Joy"

As Jenny Rubalcava described her journey to The Bridge, she recalled that she had already made four "miserable attempts" in other treatment programs to escape heroin addiction. With three children, each attempt became harder, especially when she ended up in jail. Fortunately, her father was able to take the children during her incarceration.

"When I Being in jail made her realize that she first came to desperately wanted to The Bridge, make a life-altering, permanent change. "I'd I had no tried different county idea how programs, but I knew that if I wasn't released God changes to a program I wouldn't lives." make it. I would have just picked up where I left off in my addiction." Then the probation officer offered her an application for The Bridge Restoration Ministry. God had a different plan for her.

"When I first came to The Bridge, I had no idea how God changes lives," Jenny said. "I had every intention of completing the program, but thought it would just be another piece of paper. I didn't realize I'd walk out knowing

how God put people around me to help me."

Jenny had a painful childhood. Her mother died when she was nine years old. As the youngest and only girl with seven older brothers, she felt left out. "I grew

> up mad at God and thought that He owed me something. I didn't realize--when I came here so broken, so lost, so hopeless--that I'd leave The Bridge with a relationship with God," she said.

> Currently employed at Second Chance, Jenny plans to become

a drug and alcohol counselor. She's taking online classes under the guidance of Pastor Mike Casey. "I want to help people who are where I was. I want others who struggled like I did to realize that God can change our lives."

Today, Jenny spends time with her children, and has a future filled with hope. As she put it, "Now I have joy."

The Bridge Catering Business: A Delicious Success

Since its launch one year ago, the culinary program at The Bridge has flourished. Under the direction of head chef Zach Wilson--a graduate of The Bridge--the program offers vocational training



to five residents, five days a week. The program's goal, chef Zach explained, is to prepare the men of The Bridge for employment by building skills and self-esteem.

The Bridge Culinary Program has branched out with the opening of The Bridge Catering. In less than six months, its list of clients has grown from weddings to private parties, church events at Shoreline Church and St. Angela's Church, and into the community with events at the Montage Health Foundation, the Veterans Transition Center of Monterey, and the Community Hospital Recovery Center. "We started out with nothing and now we're nearly self-sufficient," observed Zach.

Not only does catering help fund The Bridge Culinary Program, but also the men who order, prepare, and serve the food learn skills necessary to find employment in the culinary arts fields. Citing a few skills from a long list, Zach said, "They learn knife skills, product identification, to health and sanitation. And when they show great interest, they can become leads in the kitchen and go as far as ordering to menu planning."

As the business grows, the possibility of owning a restaurant is on the horizon, as it would offer additional employment to graduating Bridge residents. And it looks like the culinary arts is a good field to get into. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics,

A. Yes, I believe the Bridge purchased an app service about a year ago and did some initial work to set up the app, but there was no frequent



Second Chance's Divine Appointment

Michele Casey, Program Manager of The Bridge and manager of the Second Chance Thrift stores, just happened to be clearing out a storage shed facility rented by the Pacific Grove Second Chance store. To save money, the store was giving up the unit and its monthly rental fee. "The shed storage was a holding place for all kinds of things," said Michele, explaining that the limited floor space of the two stores keeps them constantly taking items out of the store and putting new items in for shoppers. So, what to do with all these items?

LT., Sc., USN. Benjamin M. Chime also just "happened" to be in the store at the same time. He is originally from Nigeria, had been in the U.S. Navy for 15 years, and was on assignment in Monterey with his wife, Ifeoma, and their three children. "I was looking for things to buy and send to Enugu, my village in

Nigeria," he explained. "My wife and I had been doing this for some time."

Talking with Benjamin, Chelsea, one of the staff at the store, became interested in why he wanted to buy such large quantities of clothing and other soft items. She also knew that the store was clearing out its storage shed. "I think you should talk to Michele" she recommended. "I know she can help you."

"This was definitely God's timing. It was a mutual blessing. We were in a time crunch to disperse all that was in the shed and Benjamin and his wife were looking for a way to acquire items," noted Michele, who made arrangements for Benjamin and his wife to look through the items. "They came from a village and knew firsthand how much those living there need things like children's clothes," said Michele.

It didn't take long for Benjamin and his wife to select what they knew those in their village would most need. The items were packed in storage bins. Benjamin drove a truck to Los Angeles to load them on a ship headed to Nigeria. "I plan on going to Nigeria to hand out the items, hopefully with help from others," said Benjamin. He mentioned that his wife is planning a program to continue sending items to Enugu. She named the program As I Am Serving Humanity.

"Our challenge is to get our abundance here over there and then to disperse it," Benjamin said. "We're happy to help," said Michele. "We're always looking for ways to manage overflow of things that have been on sale for a time and need to be passed on."

the success of an app is not only measured by the number of downloads, but also how many impressions occur. Someone can download your app and never open it. But if someone downloads your app and interacts with it on a daily basis, then you get more impressions. To put it in perspective, we did the app update in June 2018. In May 2018 we had a total of 187 impressions. In July 2018 we had 897 impressions. That is almost eight times as many impressions!

Q. Do you have plans to enhance the app? Maybe a Bridge 2.0 version?

A. The nice thing about Subsplash (the company who manages our app) is that they are always improving their service. So in the future there may be better video support, or different app layouts. When things like that happen I will work on making sure The Bridge app is updated and utilizes all the features Subsplash has to offer.

Q. Is there anything else you would like to add?

A. Apps are used more by people with smartphones than mobile websites are. With that data, it is great that an amazing ministry like The Bridge is able to provide an easy way for people to learn about the ministry and help support it.
