Member **Getting a Job** in the Real World

Describing how a program works is best explained by hearing from the people who founded it and have seen lives thoroughly changed. So to learn about the Vocational Training Program for residents of The Bridge here are the experiences of those who founded it and those who

are currently involved with it. This program helps The Bridge men and women face the challenges of getting a job while going through the process of changing their perspectives about life. Participants learn skills that enable them to transition into the work force and to become financially responsible before re-entering the community. Mike Casey and his wife, Michele, who founded The Bridge and the Program, talk about its purpose. been convicted of a felony? If yes, please explain," Mike explains. He knows from personal experience how hard it is for those with prison and addiction backgrounds to get jobs, but by working with community partners, The Bridge found businesses willing to hire residents. These connections are built upon trust and the proof that The Bridge residents who have been hired are good workers. "The Bridge is a working program that teaches the residents good work ethics," says Mike. He's seen how the employers who have given residents jobs "have a heart for these guys and get to know them on a personal level." The Vocation Training Program has been successful and as Mike observes, "The program continues to grow. I have seen God's grace poured out over the men and women of The Bridge."

He Found God Still Had a Plan for His Life

Sam Guerrero learned from first-hand experience that he could trust God and that God would always provide for him. Through his experience with The Bridge and getting a job he also learned some important aspects of life. "I learned that God still has a plan for my life. I felt I was too old to be forgiven, but I was incorrect. I had to learn to trust God and that He would always provide for me. Through His love, I have been able to work and provide for my family," Sam concludes.

Sam entered The Bridge in 2011 and was there for almost three years during which he held many jobs and responsibilities. After the first few months, he was asked to help The Bridge by becoming a house manager and doing maintenance work at



Calvary's church grounds.

Over time he was given another job of managing other Bridge members and was placed on The Bridge's

insurance policy so that he could drive members to appointments and court appearances.

Sam recalls, "This was a big responsibility since many of The Bridge men did not have licenses and could not drive themselves." In addition, he helped renovate The Bridge's Second Chance Thrift Store, which included painting, stripping the floor, building walls and bathrooms. He also volunteered his skills to other organizations, such as the Yellow Brick Road Thrift Store,

His Business Helps Bridge Residents Transition Back Into the Community

By offering Bridge residents jobs, business owners help them return to life's normal routines. But how to find businesses that will offer Bridge residents a job? The Main Event Transportation and Monterey Airbus does so. It transports people to events such as weddings and golf tournaments or the airport. Bridge residents are hired as customer service representatives, drivers, and detailers.

Andre Planchon, owner of this business, began hiring Bridge residents while attending Calvary Monterey. He and his wife saw firsthand the transformation that The Bridge had on residents and that the ministry was producing fruit. "We believed that God gave

By the Grace of God, I'm Still Moving Forward and Haven't **Looked Back**

It all started at the age of 12 when I had my first experience with drugs and alcohol. For the next 26

years, I caused chaos and destruction all around me because of my addiction. I never thought about the loved ones I was hurting due to my selfishness. All I cared about was getting high.

Throughout the past 20 years, I've been to jail

numerous times. I was sent to rehabilitation centers and tried many different programs assigned by the court, but these were all unsuccessful. The last time that I was locked up I knew something had to change. I was facing a possible nine years in prison and it was during this time one night that I had my first spiritual

able to support my wife and three children and pay off debts."

Sam also learned other important things about himself, such as how to work with a team and how to communicate. "I worked alone as a mechanic for many years," he notes. "With my new job as warehouse manager, I had to learn to work with a team. I had to learn how to communicate professionally. I can be very shy when first getting to know people." Furthermore, he was never required to use technology in any of his previous jobs. "I had no idea how to send and receive emails or how to communicate through group text messages. The knowledge that I had from my previous experience did not transfer over to my new career," he explains. "I am grateful for my job and stability it has given me and my family of five," he states.

been a tow truck operator, he then found a job with a tow company in Monterey but soon realized he wanted more of a challenge. This led him to an interview for a warehouse manager at the Disaster Kleenup Specialists.

It was a much bigger challenge than he expected. "The interview process involved a personality test, and I was nervous," he confides. To his surprise he was offered the job and took it. "I now supervise a team of several employees and am in charge of three warehouses and their employees. I keep track of client contents from their homes that have been in a disaster. My team cleans the contents and stores them in the warehouse," he continues. He's learned a lot. Not only is he required to use electronic cleaning systems, he's gotten even more experience by attending special training conferences and being on the company's

awakening and my "moment" with God. I knew I couldn't do this alone anymore.

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My parents never gave up on me but they had to cut off all ties with me. The life I chose to live was too much for them. It came to the point where I was stealing change

from water fountains in the middle of the night to support my methamphetamine addiction. I was homeless, living in storage units, sheds, and in my car. I spent many nights at the Calvary Church parking lot. At this point, I was 6'4, 145 pounds and near death.

After my God "moment" I knew I had to start making changes. God gave me the strength to take the necessary steps towards my recovery. I first completed the Liberty's Pride drug program and a relapse prevention class in jail. Thank the Lord I was not sent to prison and made it out of jail. I placed myself in a program up north and graduated after eight months, but I still knew that wasn't enough for me. I wasn't ready and wanted and needed more recovery time. I called The Bridge and talked with Michele Casey. Five minutes later Mike Casey called me back and said, "We'd love to have you and there is a bed waiting for you." I bought myself a bus ticket and was on my way. During my year at The Bridge, I got what I needed to prepare myself for the "real world." I received support, counseling, and the spiritual guidance to spread my wings and fly. Mike and Michele handed me the ball and it was

up to me to run with it.

By the grace of God, I'm still moving forward and haven't looked back. Since graduating The Bridge I've been living a clean and serene life. I got my smile back and everything that I ever wanted is happening for me. I moved into a new home that I can call my own. I have a great, stable job with the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce where I've been working for the last four years. I also work at the new Second Chance thrift store in Monterey, which I enjoy very much. I finally got back the girl I've always wanted, who 20 years ago couldn't be with me because I was on a dark path. The best part of it all, I have my parents back and we are a family again. I am now a person who can be trusted and people can depend on me. This is something that I've never felt before and it is amazing!

Even after almost six years of sobriety and being clean, I am still learning something new every day and strive to be better each day. I make it a point to stay connected with The Bridge and the men and women in it. I see them as my family. We are all here for the same reason, which is to get better. It doesn't matter if it's six years or six months. What we have is today and we need to make the best of it! It's not about how many times you fall down, it's about picking yourself back up and trying not to fall again. I am so grateful to God and thankful for Mike and Michele. The Bridge has helped me get to where I am today. Miracles do happen because you're reading about one now.
